

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CBL paralysed as licensed insurer goes 'rogue'

A regulated financial institution under the direct supervision of the Central Bank of Lesotho (CBL) has allegedly gone rogue, acquiring a majority stake in an unregulated company and presiding over its collapse, yet the regulator appears unwilling, or unable, to intervene.

Zenith Horizon Insurance Company Limited, which is on the CBL's list of licensed insurers, reportedly acquired about 70 percent of Mamoth Insurance/Medical Aid around 2023–2024 and took over its management.

Instead of rescuing the struggling health insurer, multiple insiders allege that Zenith's actions accelerated Mamoth's downfall.

Commitments were ignored, operations were allowed to deteriorate, and staff went unpaid for months, forcing many to resign in order to access their pensions. Some employees even faced frozen bank accounts or the risk of

Allegations also point to a potential conflict of interest, with Zenith's ties to another medical aid business raising concerns about collusion and the deliberate weakening of competition in Lesotho's medical aid sector.

Efforts by the Ministry of Trade to intervene were reportedly blocked by Zenith, which promised to rescue Mamoth itself, a promise that, according to sources, never materialised, leaving the company insolvent and employees

"I believe the public deserves to know how a major local institution was deliberately brought down," one source said. "Around 2023-2024, Zenith Horizon Insurance acquired about 70 percent of Mamoth and took over its management. Instead of delivering on promises to strengthen the company, Ze-



nith's actions appear calculated to eliminate Mamoth as a competitor."

The source added that the human cost employees driven into resignation, members left uncertain, and the loss of an independent administrator - makes this more than a corporate story.

"It is a public interest matter," the source

Another source detailed ongoing hardships. "Mamoth Health staff are currently not receiving salaries and other benefits as per their contracts. For the majority, the last pay received was in April, a few in May, and the cleaners in June." The sources said staff wrote to the acting CEO on June 30, 2025, demanding answers, but received no response.

"The acting CEO is based at Christie House as a full-time Zenith Horizon CEO. Our last meeting with Ms. Smangela (Molumeli) was on July 31, 2025, and she verbally committed to giving us specific dates for settling our pending salaries and benefits on August 6. We have never heard from her since.

"That was her first meeting with staff after taking over the company in October 2024. Payments received in the early months of this year were paid directly from Zenith, and there was no roadmap or plan for how Mamoth would

"Most staffers were paid while doing almost nothing, as clinics and service providers suspended activities due to delayed payments. Most staff eventually resigned to access pensions, leaving some with frozen accounts or the risk of losing property."

The acting CEO of Mamoth, Smangela Molumeli, is also the CEO of Zenith Horizon according to the CBL's own website. When approached by Newsday last week, Molumeli said the issues were before the regulator and declined to comment.

Yet when Newsday asked the CBL to clarify its role, the regulator distanced itself. "Just referred to the Bank's List of Licensed Financial Institutions. We do not have an entity called Mamoth Insurance," said CBL Chief Corporate Communication, Ephraim Moremoholo, on

Monday.

Newsday followed up on Tuesday, emphasising that while Mamoth is unlicensed, Zenith Horizon is duly licensed, and it was precisely for this reason that the Bank's clarity was

"When a regulated financial service provider goes in the opposite direction, into an unregulated line of business, what framework applies?" the publication asked.

"Does the Bank's oversight extend only to the licensed activities, or also to the conduct of the licensed institution within such unregulated ventures, especially when those ventures affect employees, pension funds, and consumers who may reasonably believe they are dealing with a regulated entity?"

At the time of going to print, the CBL had not responded to follow-up questions.

Technically, the Central Bank is correct that Mamoth was never a licensed financial institution. But the explanation is troubling, because it ignores the fact that a licensed insurer, Zenith Horizon, was the one that acquired and managed a business that is not regulated.

Even more concerning is that the Financial Institutions Act is clear that a financial institution cannot be licensed unless it is incorporated as a public company under the Companies Act, and even then, registration requires the prior written approval of the Commissioner of Financial Institutions (CBL).

To obtain such a licence, an applicant must provide, in writing, full particulars of the business it intends to carry on, including operational and financial plans, systems of internal control, internal audit and accounting frameworks, as well as its overall structure.

Against this legal backdrop, it would be unusual, even contradictory, for a licensed financial institution that initially got approval from the CBL (based on declared activities) to suddenly pivot into another line of business, especially unregulated or opaque ones, without the regulator stepping in.

Such a scenario raises serious questions about regulatory oversight and accountability.

The management of Mothae Diamond Mine has confirmed that all employees will be retrenched effective August 31, 2025, following the company's decision to transition into a care and maintenance programme.

In a circular issued to staff on Wednesday, 27 August 2025, the Mothae Board of Directors said the move was unavoidable due to "the persistent and current weak global diamond market conditions" which do not allow for "the commercially viable extraction of diamonds at Mothae."

The mine, located in Mokhotlong, had already suspended operations in April this year. Management said "all possible alternatives were explored to avoid the transition," but the market realities left no other option.

The care and maintenance programme, according to Mothae, will "ensure the safeguarding of Mothae's assets and preserve the remaining resource for future profitable and responsible treatment."

Among the immediate measures, the circular stated that: "All Mothae employees will be retrenched effective 31 August 2025. August 2025 salaries will still be paid at 50 percent of your normal salary."

It added: "Accrued severance benefits will be settled in monthly instalments from September 2025. A team of about 40 employees will be rehired on fixed-term contracts to implement the care and maintenance programme."

Mothae also assured workers that "Alliance Provident Fund deductions for July and August

2025 will be settled soonest" and applications for withdrawal of invested funds will be facilitated, although this process "will take approximately a month to complete."

Looking ahead, management said it was exploring options "to retreat plant and recovery tailings, as well as to connect Mothae to the Lesotho electricity grid." These plans, combined with a potential rebound in the global diamond market, could see the mine "recommence production in a meaningful and profit-

Reflecting on the challenges, Mothae management expressed gratitude to its workforce.

"We have been very fortunate to have earned our salaries and benefits since last year's shareholder change and again extend our appreciation to Executive for the funding and support provided."

Mothae was sold in 2024, with Lephema Executive Transport, owned by Minister of Local Government, Chieftainship, Home Affairs and Police, Lebona Lephema, acquiring a 70 percent stake. The Government of Lesotho retains the remaining 30 percent.

The acquisition sparked controversy, with critics raising concerns over potential conflicts of interest given Lephema's ministerial role alongside government's partial ownership of the mine.

The deal followed a conditional sales agreement announced in June 2024 between Lucapa Diamond Company - the previous majority owner - and Executive.

Finalised in August 2024 for a nominal fee of AUD 10,000 (about M122,000 or USD 6,660), Lucapa also received roughly USD 1 million in outstanding technical service payments. Under the agreement, Executive assumed all liabilities and obligations.

The mine's closure comes at a time when Lesotho's diamond industry is reeling from global demand shocks. In her 2025/26 budget speech earlier this year, Finance Minister Dr Retšelisitsoe Matlanyane reported that the mining sector had contracted by 5 percent in 2024/25, with Mothae, Kao, and Lighobong mines all struggling with poor diamond sales.

Matlanyane further warned that the performance of both the mining and manufacturing sectors is expected to continue declining in the current financial year.

Polihali Dam pushes forward despite lost time

Construction of the long-awaited Polihali Dam is finally gaining momentum despite years of setbacks that have pushed the mega project nearly a decade behind schedule.

This was revealed during a three-day media tour organised by the Lesotho Highlands Development Authority (LHDA) this week for Lesotho and South African journalists. The tour showcased progress on the Lesotho Highlands Water Project Phase II, while also highlighting the challenges that have dogged its timelines.

Reporters witnessed the roar of machinery, blasting operations, and excavation across the vast site where the dam is taking shape. Once complete, the structure will rise 166 metres, creating a reservoir on the Senqu and Khubelu rivers with a surface area of 5,053 hectares and storage capacity of 2,325 million cubic

metres.

The dam will almost double Lesotho's annual water transfer to South Africa, from 780 million cubic metres to 1,270 million, contributing an additional 490 million cubic metres to Gauteng's supply. Its infrastructure will include a spillway, a compensation outlet, and a small hydropower station.

LHDA Public Relations Manager, Mpho Brown, acknowledged the project had "lost about nine years." Although Phase II was signed in 2011 and ratified in 2013, the dam's design work only began in 2017, tenders were finalised in 2020, and construction kicked off in early 2023.

Chief Resident Engineer Ivano Vanzaghi of Matla a Metsi Joint Venture, the supervising consultant, said delays in setting up crushing plants, camps, access roads, and quarries initially slowed progress. Excavation, concrete works, and tunnel operations also fell behind schedule.

Despite this, he noted that corrective engagements with contractors were showing improvement. "There are still challenges in achieving required rates in some cases, but measures are being taken to address lagging areas," he said.

There are currently about 2,200 workers on site, more than originally projected. Engineering consultants reported 7.9 million manhours worked so far without a single fatality.

The project's price tag has surged from the initial M8 billion to an estimated M53 billion, largely due to advanced infrastructure such as the Senqu and Khubelu bridges. Around M18 billion, 36 percent of the revised budget, has already been spent.

As of July 2025, overall construction stood

at 31.2 percent, though the project has already endured a 14-month delay since November 2022. Impoundment, the process of filling the reservoir, is scheduled for January 2027, with completion and commissioning now expected in September 2029.

The contractor for the dam and appurtenant works is SUN JV, a consortium of Sinohydro 8, Sinohydro Bureau 14, UNIK, and Nthane Brothers

For South Africa, the Polihali Dam remains crucial. Yogashen Pillay, a journalist with SA's Business Report, said concerns back home over delays were eased after seeing the site first-hand.

"From what I have seen, I do understand that a lot of work has gone into Polihali. Issues like COVID-19 and contractor setbacks slowed things down, but it is pleasing to note that those issues have been resolved and construction is well underway," he said.

For Lesotho, the LHDA says Phase II is more than just a dam. Under its 10-year strategy, the authority aims to improve water and electricity access, conserve ecosystems, and enhance livelihoods while maximising commercial opportunities and good governance.

The first milestone was marked in August 2023 with the diversion of the Senqu River through tunnels, paving the way for the cofferdam and eventual rise of the dam wall.

LHWP is a massive, multi-phase water transfer and hydroelectric power project jointly developed by the governments of Lesotho and South Africa. Conceived in the 1950s but formally agreed upon in 1986 through a treaty, its core purpose is to harness Lesotho's abundant water resources in the Maloti/Drakensberg mountains and deliver water to South Africa's Gauteng province, the country's economic hub, while also generating hydropower for Lesotho.

The project involves building large dams, reservoirs, tunnels, and hydropower stations to divert water from Lesotho's rivers into South Africa's Vaal River System.

It is one of the most ambitious cross-border water schemes in Africa and has been described as a "win-win" project: Lesotho earns royalties and power, while South Africa secures a reliable water supply.

Phase I (completed in 2003) included Katse Dam, Muela Hydropower Station, and Mohale

Sugary drinks fuel mental health woes among youth

A first-of-its-kind study has found that while relatively few adolescents in Lesotho show signs of mental health or substance use problems, those who do face a staggering treatment gap, with most not receiving any form of care.

The population-based study, one of the first of its kind in a predominantly rural African setting, surveyed 1,351 adolescents aged 10 to 17 in the districts of Mokhotlong and Butha-Buthe.

The research, published in the Journal of Research on Adolescence, also found that just three percent of adolescents aged 10 to 17 years met clinical criteria for at least one mental health or substance use problem.

Among older teens, aged 15 to 17, the prevalence rose slightly to five percent. These rates are lower than global averages, which range from six percent to 28 percent, suggesting possible protective factors unique to

Lesotho's social and cultural environment.

"More female than male adolescents reported depressive and PTSD symptoms, while more older adolescents reported anxiety symptoms, as compared to younger adolescents. Moderate to high risk substance use was predominantly reported among male participants and older adolescents," the study read.

"The awareness and treatment gaps among adolescents with clinically relevant mental health or substance use problems were approximately 55 percent and 85 percent, respectively, suggesting that the majority of adolescents are unaware of the severity of their issues and do not access care," it added.

But the study also uncovered worrying gaps in care. Of those identified with a mental health condition, nearly half (45 percent) recognised they needed help, yet only 17 percent actually received care.

That leaves 83 percent without support, underscoring what researchers call an urgent

need for better awareness and services.

The findings highlight the low awareness of mental health needs among young people and their families, as well as limited knowledge of where to seek help.

"Of the three percent of youth who fell within this category, fewer than half recognised the need for treatment, and only 17 percent obtained any care. This gap parallels that among adults in Rwanda, where just six percent of those with mental health problems aware of services actually used them, and in rural Ethiopia, where only 13 percent of adults with alcohol use disorder sought help," the study read.

"Additionally, a recent scoping review in six African countries estimated that only 10 percent of children and adolescents who need mental health care obtain it. Our cascade results align with the wider regional pattern of limited problem recognition and service use, outlining the need for combined demand-and-supply-side strategies to narrow the treatment

gap in Lesotho and other similar settings," it

Lifestyle choices were also found to play a role. Consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages was strongly linked to both poor mental health outcomes and substance use, while physical activity showed no clear association with mental wellbeing.

Gender and age differences also emerged: girls were more likely to experience depressive and post-traumatic stress symptoms, while boys were more prone to substance use. Suicidal thoughts and substance use were more common among older adolescents.

While the lower-than-expected prevalence offers a glimmer of hope, researchers warn that urbanization and lifestyle changes could shift the trend upwards if not addressed.

They recommend adolescent-focused, culturally sensitive interventions, with an emphasis on raising awareness and building demand for care.

Lehae Funerals introduces cremation services

A new player in the funeral services industry, Lehae Funerals, is set to break new ground by introducing cremation of bodies within Lesotho in a move that could herald a new way of conducting funerals.

The in-country provision of cremation services is expected to put an end to the practice of local mortuaries relying on foreign-based cremation service providers, thereby cutting the costs associated with the trip.

The new funeral parlour, which is a subsidiary of the Alliance Group Investment Holding Company (AGIHC), which houses Alliance Insurance Company among others, was officially launched this week at its head office at Likotsi in Maseru.

Lipuo Sehloho, the Chief Operations Officer (COO) of Lehae Funerals, said at the launch that they officially opened their mortuary in January this year, where bodies are to be cremated once the crematorium is ready.

"We are going to be the first mortuary to provide



cremation services within Lesotho starting from October 2025," she said.

"We are at an advanced stage in setting up the crematorium, and it will be ready to operate by October," she added.

Other products and services offered by Lehae Funerals include repatriation of bodies from neighbouring countries into Lesotho, body handling and funeral preparation, storage facilities, casket sales, tombstones, memorial services, and funeral policies, among others.

Also speaking at the launch, Alliance Insurance's Public Relations and Corporate Communications Manager, Limakatso Mokobocho, said providing both life cover insurance and funeral services under one group would bring convenience to their clients and also simplify the process of making claims.

Despite having been in operation for a short time following its establishment in October 2023, Lehae is well-remembered for delivering a high-profile funeral service for the late music icon, Malome Vector, whose real name is Bokang 'Moleli, in August 2024.

Angus Yeats, the Chief Executive Officer of Alliance Insurance Company, said Lehae Funerals is open to partnering with other service providers in the country to bring services closer to the people.

The company currently operates in Maseru, Mafeteng, Mohales's Hoek, Quthing, Berea, Leribe, Botha Bothe, and Mokhotlong districts through mostly partnering with other mortuaries.

Unresolved village health workers' issues haunt govt

Nearly three years after a government promise, the Ministry of Health is still grappling with ensuring that Village Health Workers (VHWs) are paid regularly.

In December 2022, during World AIDS Day commemorations at Bethany Health Centre in Berea, the Minister of Health, Selibe Mochoboroane, pledged to resolve the financial challenges affecting VHWs.

Mochoboroane promised that arrears would be settled by the end of that year and that from April 2023, workers would begin receiving monthly payments "like any other civil servant."

He, at the time, emphasised that addressing VHWs' concerns was one of his priorities, noting that management meetings were being held weekly to push the matter forward.

However, almost three years later, the issue remains unresolved. The Ministry's Principal Secretary (PS), Maneo Moliehi Ntene, confirmed that the workers' grievances have not yet been fully addressed.

"If ever we had a budget, we would have already been done with the process and village health workers would be having what they requested," Ntene said.

She explained that while the Ministry has completed internal processes and sought funding from the Ministry of Finance, budgetary constraints remain a stumbling block.

She added that the Ministry has decided to comply with a court order directing it to formalise VHWs' employment.

"We need them, and we have no objection to the court order because we understand the conditions and environment they work under. Once they receive what they have asked for, our responsibility will be to monitor them and ensure that everyone performs their duties effectively. However, it would be unfair to demand accountability without improving their working conditions. We must also provide clear terms of engagement so that they remain fully committed," she added.

The Director of Human Resources in the Ministry of Health, Lisebo Mohololi, said they had met with representatives of the village health workers to discuss the way forward.

"After the meeting, we wrote to the finance department, which directed us to begin the process with the Public Service. That's where we encountered challenges, because if the village health workers are absorbed into the public service, many would be excluded due to the age limit. This goes against their wish to maintain their current employment terms so that no one is left out, while still receiving increased allowances as requested," Mohololi said.

She added: "We also considered requesting a revision of the court order, particularly the part requiring that they be regarded as civil servants. That condition compels us to go through the Public Service, where the age restriction would apply."

Mohololi further stated that a deed of settlement has now been drafted and is awaiting the Principal Secretary's signature, after which the ministry will approach the finance department for funding.

Chairman of the Social Cluster Portfolio Committee, Mokhothu Makhalanye, emphasised that as the ministry works to resolve the matter, it must ensure that all actions comply with the law

The Secretary General of the Lesotho Workers' Association (LEWA), Hlalefang Seoaholimo, noted that the Ministry of Health's efforts were at an advanced stage. Speaking on behalf of the village health workers, Seoaholimo expressed appreciation for the ministry's commitment.

He said they were now waiting for the ministry to conclude discussions with finance so that a final agreement could be signed and the court order implemented.

He highlighted that the court ruling simply required that village health workers be recognised as employees of the Ministry of Health and be entitled to the relevant benefits.

EU Ambassador Amadei reflects on a meaningful tenure in Lesotho

The European Union (EU) Ambassador to Lesotho, Paola Amadei, says her tenure has been meaningful for the country. As her tour of duty comes to an end, she sat down with Newsday journalist Thoboloko Ntšonyane to reflect on the EU's work in Lesotho and how the Delegation, in partnership with the government and other stakeholders, has implemented programs impacting many Basotho, especially in underserved communities. She also shared her thoughts on the importance of fostering synergies between the government, international organisations, and civil society.

Below is an excerpt from the interview.

Thoboloko Ntšonyane (TN): Looking back on your journey as EU Ambassador to Lesotho, how would you describe your tour of duty?

Paola Amadei (PA): It went by so fast, never a dull moment. I enjoyed every bit of it, even amid unavoidable challenges. I am confident that I did my utmost to serve both the EU's and Lesotho's interests.

TN: You led a dedicated team at the EU office that helped realise the EU's mandate. What are you most proud of?

PA: Indeed, the Delegation team, composed in equal parts of EU and Lesotho professionals, is a great asset not only for each EU Ambassador to Lesotho but, more importantly, for the country. My colleagues are deeply committed to delivering results and strengthening relationships. This also extends to the wider Team Europe, which includes embassies of EU member states accredited to Lesotho. They are all keen to maintain and expand relations beyond traditional development cooperation, seeking opportunities for trade, investment, mutual growth, and enhanced partnerships at the multilateral level.

Although the Delegation flies the EU flag alone in Maseru, I always felt the strength of Team Europe's support and solidarity. I am proud that the EU Delegation has brought Europe, in all its diversity, a little closer to Lesotho. Initiatives such as the European Film Festival may seem small, but they tangibly showcase EU creativity, foster mutual understanding, promote local creators, and encourage cultural exchange.

I also hope that the recent extension of the visa waiver to all EU citizens will encourage more visits to Lesotho and open new channels of interaction at all levels.

We have had many opportunities to highlight the EU's contribution in

the water, energy, and governance sectors. Seeing remote communities access safe water, sanitation, sustainable energy, and public administration services remains a major milestone for the EU in Lesotho, and for me personally.

TN: I imagine it was not always a smooth ride. What were some of the challenges you and your team faced in implementing EU programmes with government and community partners?

PA: It is always a challenge to translate commitments and shared values into concrete actions. During my mandate in Lesotho, this was very true. Lesotho and the EU share values and principles, but the question is always: how do we put them into practice? I am glad that under the Energy Pledge, the EU and Lesotho are partnering to increase sustainable energy production and efficiency. This is more than just words; it aims at a common target that benefits both the planet and our citizens.

Equally, Lesotho and the EU are united in condemning Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine and in seeking a just peace with the necessary security guarantees. For some, the conflict may feel remote, but it has direct impacts on Lesotho, from higher food prices to the weakening of the principles of territorial integrity and sovereignty on which small states depend for survival.

In implementing programmes, we worked tirelessly to respect deadlines, uphold standards, and follow rules so that final beneficiaries could see results. We owe this accountability both to EU tax-payers and to the people of Lesotho. At times, this clashed with a laissez-faire attitude, or worse, with individuals putting personal interests first. Fortunately, we were able to overcome such obstacles and deliver results.

TN: You facilitated Basotho's participation in the European Union Visitors Programme (EUVP), including MPs, a Principal Secretary, and journalists. Why was this important?

PA: The EU runs many programmes aimed at bringing people of the EU and partner countries closer together. I am very fond of the EUVP, of which you yourself were a beneficiary, because it gives visitors the chance to engage directly with European institutions and the people behind them. It allows participants to form their own impressions and make their own judgments.

Each programme is tailor-made:

journalists meet colleagues and communication experts, while MPs meet peers and attend sessions. The programme is intense, ensuring maximum exposure in a short time. We are now eagerly awaiting to see if another Mosotho will be selected in the next round of applications.

TN: You arrived when Lesotho was embarking on its reform process and are leaving just after the 10th Amendment to the Constitution was passed. Can we expect the EU to continue supporting reforms, given that at one stage it withdrew its support?

PA: The EU responded to the government's call at the start of the reform process, funding the preparatory phase to ensure it was inclusive and thorough. Once draft bills reached Parliament, it was time for the EU to step back and leave space for Lesotho's democratic institutions.

However, the EU has never stopped supporting the principles underpinning the reforms, namely inclusiveness, transparency, accountability, and fairness. Our programmes continue to advance these values in partnership with our counterparts. For example, under the Inclusive Lesotho programme launched in May, civic education is being promoted to help citizens better understand and exercise their rights. This is just one example among many.

TN: Your work has taken you from cities to some of the country's most remote villages. What will you remember most about Basotho?

PA: I wouldn't say I was forced to travel the country, I was eager to do so. Being on the ground allowed me to witness both the needs and the impact of EU support. It was immensely rewarding. Everywhere I went, I was struck by the generosity and openness of the people. Communities organised warm welcomes, offered delicious meals, and sang beautiful songs. The spirit of King Moshoeshoe lives on in the hospitality with which Basotho embrace visitors.

TN: The EU has worked not only with the government but also with partners like UNDP and UNICEF. Why is partnership so central to your work?

PA: EU support is ultimately aimed at the people of Lesotho, especially the most vulnerable, ensuring no one is left behind. To do this effectively, we work with government institutions, civil society, UN agencies, EU member states, and others.

For example, children's courts were built and equipped through

cooperation with the Chief Justice's office, UNICEF, and World Vision. The Inclusive Lesotho programme involves the Independent Electoral Commission, the Ministry of Education, UNDP, International IDEA, and local CSOs. Our support for Renoka and for market access programmes is implemented by GIZ, which also channels German government resources. These partnerships bring in the necessary expertise to deliver the best results.

TN: Recently, we saw you in Mohale's Hoek and Botha-Bothe handing over decentralised Ombudsman offices. Why was this important?

PA: Decentralisation is a priority for Lesotho's institutions, and the EU is glad to support it. It is not an abstract concept but a concrete way of bringing services closer to citizens. The Ombudsman's decentralisation had been planned for years but lacked resources. Even small offices mark a first step and signal the State's willingness to be present where citizens need services.

In the coming months, my successor will inaugurate new decentralised offices for the DCEO in the same towns, as well as Legal Aid offices in three other districts.

TN: The EU has supported Lesotho across many sectors, from water and energy to justice and reforms. How do you ensure return on investment?

PA: Accountability mechanisms are built into every programme, regardless of size or implementation method. They ensure that activities are delivered as planned, cost-effectively and transparently. Strengthening oversight institutions such as the Auditor General and the DCEO has been key in ensuring that public services and donor-supported programmes, are properly monitored.

Finally, the media play a vital role in holding institutions accountable, ensuring that results are sustainable over time.

TN: What message do you have for your successor?

PA: Mette Sunnergren, the designated Ambassador, is an experienced and committed professional with a keen interest in Lesotho. I wish her the best of success and trust she will enjoy the full support of all her Lesotho counterparts.

TN: Your parting words?

PA: Time is short, so I will not be able to say goodbye and thank everyone personally. Allow me to use your newspaper to express my gratitude to all those I met during my journey in Lesotho—you made this experience truly memorable.



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Sothokids put Lesotho on the world stage against all odds

Lesotho's cultural identity shone brightly this year as Sothokids Culture Agency embarked on a groundbreaking creative tour across Europe and the Caribbean, showcasing authentic Basotho traditions to global audiences.

The youth-led agency departed the Mountain Kingdom on July 11 this year and returned on August 27, after performing at the renowned Festivals du Sud Tour.

Their journey included stops in France, Spain, Switzerland, and the Caribbean Islands, where they shared stages with internationally acclaimed artist Omali Themba, proudly flying Lesotho's flag.

The tour was a milestone not only for the young performers but for the nation at large. At a time when African culture often struggles for visibility on the global stage, Sothokids stood out as the sole representative from the continent at the festival.

For six weeks, the group captured audiences with vibrant displays of music, dance, storytelling, and traditional attire. Their performances left lasting impressions on festivalgoers who had little exposure to Basotho culture.

A highlight came in Evolène, Switzerland, where their performance before a packed hall earned a standing ovation. It was a defining moment for the troupe and a proud achievement for Lesotho.

"We successfully staged multiple performances across Europe, and everywhere we went our culture was warmly received," said the agency's general manager, Sebabatso Litlali.

"In Switzerland, the audience could not stop applauding. That was a powerful reminder that our



traditions have a place on the global stage."

Beyond live shows, the group held cultural workshops and dialogue sessions, sharing heritage and traditions while collaborating with artists in France, Spain, and Switzerland. These exchanges created artistic blends that fused Basotho rhythms with European expressions.

"These collaborations birthed something new and beautiful, true cultural fusion. We danced, sang, and even shared meals and stories with our hosts. It was more than a performance, it was cultural immersion." Litlali explained.

Their impact was widely recognised. In Géménos, France, the group received a Cultural Appreciation Award for their contribution to global diversity through performance. They also attracted European media coverage, with appearances on local radio and television extending Lesotho's cultural reach.

Yet, behind the triumph lay financial struggles. Although the festival covered major costs such as flights, meals, and accommodation, significant expenses remained.

Founder and director Makhebe Seatlana disclosed that he personally invested nearly M100,000 to cover attire, visas, and logistics.

"We were not expecting monetary support from government because the invitation had already catered for most expenses," Seatlana explained in an exclusive interview with Newsday.

"But we had hoped for at least moral support from the Ministry of Tourism, Sports, Arts and Culture or from our embassies abroad. Sadly, even when we asked for help with visas or local transport, our requests were ignored."

He noted that the only official who reached out during the trip was Lesotho's Ambassador to Switzerland, Tšiu Khathibe, who visited them during their stay.

Despite this lack of official backing, private partners stepped forward to make the tour possible. Among the sponsors were Buti's Car Wash, Sechaba Milling Co., FNB Lesotho, Jonko-Mane Denims, EcoFest, Brand New Vixion, TWGI Group, and Econet Telecom Lesotho.

"Without these sponsors, our journey would not have been possible," Seatlana emphasised.

Their success has already earned them an invitation to the 2026 edition of the festival in Northern Europe. But enthusiasm is tempered by the financial strain.

"Because we represented Lesotho so well, the organisers extended another invitation. But knowing the costs I carried this year, I am seriously considering turning it down. Even though flights and accommodation are covered, smaller costs like visas and traditional attire are still significant. It may simply not be sustainable to repeat this," Seatlana said.

His concerns highlight the broader challenges facing grassroots cultural groups in Lesotho, where creativity often exceeds institutional support.

Even so, the achievements of Sothokids cannot be denied. By bringing the Basotho spirit to Europe and the Caribbean, they placed Lesotho firmly on the map of global cultural exchange.

For the young performers, the journey was life-changing. They showcased their heritage while learning new forms of storytelling and collaboration through international workshops.

"This tour was proof that Basotho culture belongs on the world stage. We may be a small country, but our traditions are powerful, and when shared with the world, they resonate," Seatlana said.






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Magugu unveils Mafeteng heritage pieces

"A striking ode to Thebe Magugu's Sotho heritage, the Mafeteng women's dress and the Mafeteng men's compression top will become available on 10th


September 2025 – named after the city the Magugu family hails from in Lesotho," Magugu on Wednesday.

Notši snubs Lioli again i bold WC qualifiers

In a controversial move that has sent shockwaves through Lesotho's football circles, Likuena head coach Leslie Notši has once again left out all Lioli FC players from his provisional squad for the upcoming 2026 FIFA World Cup Qualifiers.

Despite Lioli clinching the Vodacom Premier League title earlier this year, not a single player from the Teyateyaneng-based giants has cut next month's crucial back-to-back qualifiers against South Africa and Benin.

Notši's 23-man provisional squad, announced earlier this week, features a mix of local and foreign-based talent, with the coach opting for continuity by retaining the core of players involved in

Yet, the absence of Lioli's top performers, including COSAFA Cup standouts Mphale Mphalaole, Mokoteli Mohapi, Tholang Makuru, and Leluma Posholi, has raised serious questions about selection

Motebang Sera, currently plying his trade at Venda Academy in South Africa's Motsepe Foundation

Championship, has also been omitted. Sera, once a mainstay in Likuena's attack, has been overlooked in favour of Lijabatho FC duo Khaketla Matamane and Teboho Masuoanesignaling Notši's clear trust in emerging local talent.

"The foreign-based players will join the rest of the team before it departs for South Africa," confirmed Lesotho Football Association's (LeFA) media officer Mikia Kalati, who declined to comment on the coach's selection decisions.

The decision has sparked a heated debate among

fans, pundits, and former players, particularly as Lesotho's goal-scoring record in 2025 has been dismal, with just two goals in five competitive matches.

With Likuena currently sitting fifth in Group C of the CAF qualifiers with six points, there's growing pressure on Notši to produce results in the double-header.

Lioli's exclusion has been defended by some, pointing to the club's recent involvement in a Four-Nations Club Tournament in Namibia, which may have left players fatigued.

However, critics argue that denying Lioli players a spot in the national team robs the side of experienced talent and denies those players critical exposure at the international level.

"Whether it's due to workload or tactical preference, leaving out the league's best performers is a gamble ahead of such crucial fixtures," said one local

In a rare moment in Lesotho's sports fraternity, Maseru City Run (MCR) will, for the first time, introduce a sports insurance policy to cover athletes' accidents during the 2026 edition.

According to the event organisers, Eventful Moments, they have a partnership with LNIG Hollard to provide the insurance cover for the one-day

The annual road race, which runs around Lesotho's capital city, Maseru, has been growing in leaps and bounds over the past few years, drawing in both local and international participants, professionals and amateurs alike.

Initially starting with just over 350 participants for the inaugural event in 2023, the second instalment of the event saw over 800 athletes taking part in various activities, including the 42.2 km race, 21.1km race, 10km race, 5km race, and 1.6 km run for the children.

The 2025 event saw the race growing even bigger by attracting a record 1426 athletes, and also welcoming more sponsors on board. The edition was also honoured by Queen 'Masenate Mohato Seeiso and her son, Crown Prince Lerotholi Mohato Seeiso, both participating in the races.

Now, in anticipation of bringing together 4,000 people at the next race scheduled for February 22, 2026, the organisers have added a number of enhancements for the race, with the insurance policy as the highlight.

"The insurance policy premium is M55. This insurance policy is the first one in the history of athletics in Lesotho," said Eventful Moments' Director Hollard, confirmed to this publication that they are involved in the race.

The introduction of insurance in MCR follows an unfortunate fatal accident where a 21-kilometre runner tragically perished during the 2025 race edition. Tšeliso Makana (36) collapsed mid-race before being rushed to the hospital, where he was later confirmed dead.

Other improvements to be seen in the race are the establishment of a 12-member Local Organising Committee (LOC) to help with the planning and

The LOC is made up of different stakeholders relevant to the race, such as sponsors, runners, media, station managers, corporates, race organisers representatives, Maseru City Council (MCC), Maseru Athletics Academy, and Lesotho Tourism Development Corporation (LTDC).

The event also features an aerobics session at Maseru Club grounds and inclusivity-focused races, such as a category for people with disabilities and a

dress the issue of water shortage in the race that has plagued the race in the past, by manufacturing their own drinking water for the race.

They are also engaging more medical service providers, like hospitals and surgeries, to increase the supply of ambulance services from four to ten

Thabo John Tšoeute, the race manager, indicated that leading up to the race date, they are introducing regular training runs for non-athletes to ensure that they are fit to run on the big day.

The first of these trainings, dubbed Sunday Runs, which target 10km and 5km amateur or social runners, will commence on August 31.

"We are trying to encourage our participants to be in good physical condition to enjoy the experience of participating in our races. In particular, we encourage amateur runners to go for medical checks before running, and also refrain from counterproductive lifestyle habits leading up to the race day," Tšoeute said.

Kick4Life Ladies eliminated from CAF tourney


The Women Super League champions Kick4Life's maiden continental journey came to a disappointing end this week, following two heavy defeats in the group stage of the 2025 CAF Women's Champions League COSAFA qualifiers.

Drawn in Group B alongside Botswana's Gaborone United Ladies and Eswatini's Young Buffaloes, the Lesotho side struggled to match the experience and intensity of their regional counterparts during the tournament hosted in Johannesburg. Kick4Life kicked off their campaign on Monday

with a promising start against Young Buffaloes. The Lesotho champions initially stunned the Eswatini side with an early lead, showcasing grit and ambition. However, the Buffaloes soon regained control of the game, scoring three unanswered goals to seal a 3-1 victory.

Despite the opening day loss, hope lingered that Kick4Life could bounce back in their second group encounter on Wednesday. But it was not to be. Gaborone United stormed to a 7-0 lead by halftime, exposing the gulf in class and experience.

While Kick4Life managed to regroup and show greater composure in the second half, they conceded three more goals before netting a late consola-



tion, ending the match in a humbling 10-1 defeat.

Speaking after the match, coach Elizabeth Yelimala acknowledged the challenges her team faced but expressed pride in their effort and resilience.

"It was tough conceding as early as the second minute, which destabilised the team," Yelimala said.

"But I am happy with the way we responded in the last 20 minutes to get our goal. We threw in some of our youngsters who had energy, and we managed to score."

The campaign marked Kick4Life's debut appearance on the continental stage, making them only the second club from Lesotho to participate in the CAF Women's Champions League qualifiers, following Lesotho Defence Force (LDF) Ladies' previous two campaigns.

Despite the heavy score lines. Yelimala stressed the importance of the experience gained.

'We are very grateful to have participated and to the association for registering us. This has been a valuable learning curve. We need to improve our stamina and speed of play to compete at national and regional tournaments."

While the early exit was a tough pill to swallow, Kick4Life's participation offered valuable insights into the level of preparation required to succeed at the continental level, a stepping stone for Lesotho women's football as it continues to develop.

The Lesotho Football Association (LeFA) has written to three Premier League clubs, Matlama FC, Bantu FC, and Linare FC, requesting the release of players selected for the provisional Likuena squad ahead of the FIFA 2026 World Cup Qualifiers.

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If granted, the request will sideline several key players from the Ramela Foundation Soccer Spectacular, scheduled for August 30-31.

In his letter to the presidents of Matlama, Bantu, and Linare, Mohapi wrote: "RE: players in camp for the FIFA 2026 World Cup Qualifiers.
